The Conference Cross

The biennial National Deacons Conference is being held this year 2025 at the Adelaide Hills Convention Centre in Hahndorf SA from Thursday 27 February to Sunday 2 March 2025. About 80 people from the diaconal community in Australia have registered to attend.

In appreciation of the sustained support through prayers and generous donations received from parishes, parishioners, and clergy, the deacons in Adelaide desire to share something of the Conference with you. This is the National Association of Deacons (NAD) Conference Cross that is currently going around the parishes in the Archdiocese of Adelaide.

This lovely NAD Conference Cross was made by Vicki Clark, an Aboriginal artist based in Victoria and donated to the conference in 2015.

Here's an account of the **symbols** adorning the Cross:

- **1. Red background**: the colour of the earth of this country and the generosity of the custodians of the land allow us to walk upon it as deacons and share the presence of the Creator Spirit throughout the land.
- 2. The Southern Cross: pointer to *Bunjil* (Creator Spirit); guide for the people on the paths they take and for the seasons of many plants.
- **3.** A 'U' shape with a small one inside and a bar below: this is for the women and children: the wife and sons and daughters and grandchildren of deacons. Their role is important hence the symbol is right up the top.
- 4. Ten 'patches' around the borders of the Cross: the Ten Commandments.
- **5. Seven 'U' shapes with a vertical bar beside**: these are the men with 'spears' ready to go out into the world the seven men of Acts who were chosen, commissioned, and sent out (precursors to deacons).
- **6.** Red Sash from left shoulder to right hip: Keeping Christ and his Body and Blood (especially) close to our hearts. The deacon is minister of the Chalice.
- 7. Four hands: the Four Gospels, with 208 dots around each, representing the broad 'church' of people with whom, and to whom, deacons bring the Word. Sharing in Christ's Gospel ministry leaves a mark on the world, a handprint of the deacon's presence.

Second Reading

Hebrews 2:14-18

He took to himself descent from Abraham

Since all the children share the same blood and flesh, Christ too shared equally in it, so that by his death he could take away all the power of the devil, who had power over death, and set free all those who had been held in slavery all their lives by the fear of death. For it was not the angels that he took to himself; he took to himself descent from Abraham. It was essential that he should in this way become completely like his brothers so that he could be a compassionate and trustworthy high priest of God's religion, able to atone for human sins. That is, because he has himself been through temptation he is able to help others who are tempted.

Luke 2:22-40

My eyes have seen your salvation

When the day came for them to be purified as laid down by the Law of Moses, the parents of Jesus took him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord, – observing what stands written in the Law of the Lord: *Every first-born male must be consecrated to the Lord* – and also to offer in sacrifice, in accordance with what is said in the Law of the Lord, a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons.

Now in Jerusalem there was a man named Simeon. He was an upright and devout man; he looked forward to Israel's comforting and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death until he had set eyes on the Christ of the Lord. Prompted by the Spirit he came to the Temple and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the Law required, he took him into his arms and blessed God; and he said:

'Now, Master, you can let your servant go in peace, just as you promised; because my eyes have seen the salvation which you have prepared for all the nations to see, a light to enlighten the pagans and the glory of your people Israel.'

As the child's father and mother stood there wondering at the things that were being said about him, Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, 'You see this child: he is destined for the fall and for the rising of many in Israel, destined to be a sign that is rejected – and a sword will pierce your own soul too – so that the secret thoughts of many may be laid bare.'

There was a prophetess also, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was well on in years. Her days of girlhood over, she had been married for seven years before becoming a widow. She was now eighty-four years old and never left the Temple, serving God night and day with fasting and prayer. She came by just at that moment and began to praise God; and she spoke of the child to all who looked forward to the deliverance of Jerusalem.

When they had done everything the Law of the Lord required, they went back to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. Meanwhile the child grew to maturity, and he was filled with wisdom; and God's favour was with him.

A PROMENADE (DEACONS' CROSS)

For a number of years, whenever a deacons' conference has been held in a particular place, a cross, expressly designed for the National Association of Deacons, has been installed at the conference location for its duration. This year's conference will be held in the Adelaide area Hahndorf, from Feb 27th to Mar 2nd, the organising committee would like to take the cross on a pilgrimage through some of the parishes that have, or have had, deacons actively involved in ministry within the parishes. 
