

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### **100 Years Congratulations**

#### St Joseph's School Time Capsule Opened

The contents of the Time Capsule were celebrated at the school' Centenary Gala Dinner on February 8<sup>th</sup>.

In 1988 the idea of a Time Capsule was first thought of but it was not until St Joseph's Day 1992 that it was actually completed and put into the ground. This explained why people had contacted the school believing there were 2 capsules. The capsule contained items from 1988, 1991 and 1992. There were items of memorabilia from the era as well as students work and letters from parents to their children

Over the years with building projects and changes to the grounds there was some confusion as to the capsule's location. While plumbers were searching for a water leak a few years ago and with the help of some old photos it was located, it was sitting in about 30cm's of water so it was decided to remove it from the ground. The capsule was a large Poly Pipe which is on display, sealed at both ends so it was thought the contents would be unaffected by the water. It was safely stored with the intention for it to be opened as part of the 100 Years Celebrations.

Late last year the Centenary Committee decided it should be opened to ensure the contents were intact, unfortunately it had leaked and the bottom third of the contents were wet, items were carefully removed and dried to preserve them, unfortunately some items were damaged. All of the letters from parents were unaffected.

Sr Elizabeth Murphy, the Principal of the school in 1992, had written a letter to the school community 25 years in to the future. This letter was placed in the capsule. A copy of the letter is included in this edition of Looking In. It was also shared with those present at the Gala Dinner. She refers to 25 years and the capsule being opened in 2017 as this was her understanding at the time of writing.

The story of St Joseph's School began in 1925 on Ngarrindjeri Land, with the opening of St Joseph's Convent School on Railway Terrace, marking a significant milestone in the history of the Roman Catholic Church at Murray Bridge. The grand opening on Sunday, January 25th was officiated by Rev. Father O'Connell, the Parish priest and the Rev. Father Gatzemeyer, with the presence of Sister Marion, Sister Carolus, Sister Francis Raphael, Sister Mary Claude (Provincial of the Order) and Sister Teresa who were the first permanent teachers from the Order of St Joseph's. Although the town had long dreamed of a Catholic School, financial debt from both the church and the presbytery delayed its establishment. Fr. O'Connell, who had requested the support of the Sisters of Saint Joseph in 1925, saw the school open with an enrolment of 114 students. Initially, Captain William Randell's house on Mannum Road was purchased by Fr O'Connell for the school and convent, and the term

"convent school" likely referred to the use of rooms in the Sister's convent. By 1934, two stone school rooms were built and the original classroom block, which later became the administration building, was expanded to accommodate growing numbers. A new convent and additional facilities were required by 1964 to meet increasing enrolment, prompting the construction of a two-story convent on Florence Street. Significant milestones continued, including the appointment of the school's first male teacher in 1974 and the hiring of the first lay teacher by 1975, creating a balanced staff of fifty-fifty lay and religious teachers. The Sisters of St Joseph led the school until 1998, when Mr Mark Fitzpatrick became the first lay Principal. Over the years, the school grew and in 2023 the school expanded to include Secondary Middle Schooling Years 7,8 and 9. St Joseph's School is today a Reception to Year 9 Catholic School that is an integral part of the Hills cluster of Catholic Schools with enrolments of up to 470 students, marking a long history of development and success.

Her legacy is one of dedication, compassion and love for the St Joseph's school community.



# St Joseph's 100 years centenary

#### St Joseph's School Centenary Celebration - Gala Dinner

On Saturday February 8<sup>th</sup> a Gala Dinner was held at the Venue Centre, Murray Bridge Racing Club to celebrate the Centenary of St Joseph's School. Over 170 people attended, some having travelled from interstate to celebrate 100 years of Catholic Education in Murray Bridge, the Josephite Sisters arrived in Murray Bridge 12<sup>th</sup> of January 2025 to establish St Joseph's School. The MC's for the evening were Joshua Law a past student and current teacher and Michael Gates who recently retired after almost 26 years working in administration at the school.

Current Principal Ros Oates welcomed everyone and gave a heartfelt speech evidencing her passion and dedication to the school community. She made special mention of St Mary of the Coss MacKillop who she stated is her inspiration for her style of leadership, she also mentioned the influence Sr Teresa Brooks the principal during her time as a teacher at the school in the 1990's. She spoke of the many challenges of being a leader in education today and she referenced to those present Mary MacKillops quote "Never see a need without doing something about it".

A focus of the evening was the contents of the Time Capsule that had been placed in the ground on St Joseph's Day 1992. A letter from the principal at that time Sr Elizabeth Murphy which was included in the capsule was read out. The capsule contained students work, newspaper articles, other mementos from that time and letters that parents had written to their children. Some of the items were shared and they were all on display and available for those present to collect.

There was also a large display of memorabilia which created great interest amongst those in attendance. A fun part of the night was a "St Joseph's Quiz" testing people's knowledge of the history of the school.

A role call for each decade of the school was conducted to recognise past students present. They were reminded that their presence and contributions helped shape the rich history and spirit of the school community. Past students who are now current staff members were also acknowledged Lynne Liebich (nee Hodgen), Meghan Rowland (nee Gates), Georgia Pfeiffer (nee O'Neil), Joshua Law and Luke Woods

The oldest student present was Mr Jeff Martin who attended from 1944 to 1955, he was invited to speak and gave an informative and humorous speech.

The past Principals and Deputy Principals were acknowledged and thanked for their leadership, vision and unwavering commitment to the school community, Mark Corrigan, Brady Stallard and Sonja Smith were in attendance. The legacy that the Sisters of St Joseph's built during their leadership from 1925 to 1998 was acknowledged, during this time 71 Sisters were a part of the school. At this time Sr Brigette Sipa the Regional Leader of the Sisters of St Joseph's from Kensington gave a wonderful speech celebrating the rich history of the school and the dedication of staff, past and present. The first Lay Principal of the School Mark Fitzpatrick appointed in 1999 was also acknowledged as were current Principal Ros Oates and Deputy Principal Jamie Mulcahy.

Many past and present staff were in attendance and heartfelt gratitude was extended to them for their dedication, service and contribution to the school community. Elizabeth Kwan while not in attendance was acknowledged as the longest serving staff member.

Fr Phillip Marshall then came forward to present past and present staff with certificates in recognition of their significant milestone years of service to the school. It was acknowledged that their legacy of service is deeply valued and they were thanked for the many years of care and commitment they had given to St Joseph's.

#### Time Capsule letter 16.03.92

Dear People who have gathered to share the history, the story that is represented in this time capsule. I greet you warmly!

Right now we are preparing to seal this capsule. We have talked about putting down the capsule for the last four years. It was a dream of David Spencer to do so, he just never dreamt we would take as long to do so. Nor did he dream that, in the end we would still be rushing to have all in place by St Joseph's day. Rush has been a bit of a mark of the 80's and 90's. Maybe in twenty-five years time there might be a better balance between 'rush' and 'reflection'.

I hope that when the capsule is opened you will enjoy the remembering of days past, that you will find joy in what has been good & healing for whatever was difficult. I hope that a lot of todays families are able to be in touch with this place which has had a part to play in the old fabric of life – a place where you meet each other and your God, he's always waiting to be met so 'he'll' be here for you in 2017.

Over these next 25 years we will all experience the totality of being human, being glad, being sad, succeeding, failing, something of living and dying. May the Jesus who was 100% human and still lives that in us, be your companion.

When you open the capsule, I'd like to think that you might find the story of Fr Crowley in the little blue book and the history of the parish. I believe the second to last paragraph about this man also is Murray Bridge's St Francis Xavier, is God's call to us now, to you 2017 people. I believe, too, that the fact that the Murray, Australia's "water way" is not here by accident but is the work of a "Provider God". I hope that it is still a water way providing life.

I have spent five years here. I've enjoyed the time which has been full of challenges & opportunities & a few heartaches. It has been a time when as a community we tried to re-develop the school plant. That involved considerable money, effort & at some stages the "rush" of doing things differently. I've appreciated the efforts of each of the Board, P & F, people in the community, the staff & children.

Quite a few people gave tremendous service but it would be remiss not to mention Ray Schliebs and Dennis Willis's who in the '87, '88 planning time were able to "see" a lot could be done if we worked together. Succeeding Boards & their Chairpersons, David Spencer, and now Des O'Sullivan have continued to lead by serving.

There may, or may not be, Sisters of St Joseph working in the school in 2017. Whether that be the case of not, I hope that the spirit of Mary MacKillop is active and urgent in this place and your lives. I hope too that young women will know what a great way it is to live one's life a Josephite. Maybe 2017 could be the year of the call for some of

#### **OUR VIETNAMESE WEDDING TRIP - BERNIE & MICHAEL GATES**

In November last year, Bernie and I travelled to Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam to attend the wedding of our friends Jane and David Nguyen. David is the brother of Alvin who is a member of the Murray Bridge Parish.

Travelling to Vietnam and attending the wedding was an experience that 10 years ago we could never have imagined taking place. It came about because Alvin came to Murray Bridge in 2017 on a VISA to work at Thomas Foods, shortly before that his brother also came to Australia but was working at an abattoir in Swan Hill. Through English Lessons that I was running for the Vietnamese community at that time I met Alvin soon after his arrival and this was the beginning of a very special relationship not only with him but his whole family here in Australia and in Vietnam. In time we met David and later his then girlfriend Jane.

The wedding was over 2 days and totally different to traditional Weddings as we know them. We travelled to Vietnam with Alvin arriving the Tuesday before the Wedding and were met at the Airport by Alvin's fiancé Sou's parents, the next day we spent the whole day together with them and Alvin taking a tour to the Mekong Delta. We were treated to a boat trip around the Delta visiting, at one stop while treated to morning tea under the Coconut Palms we were treated to traditional Vietnamese Musical instruments and singing by the family members who hosted us

Thursday morning began with a traditional breakfast of Pho with Sou's Dad and Alvin's brother Daniel who still lives in Vietnam with their Mum. Later that morning we had a chance to relax with Sou's Mum and Dad. We were treated to an incredible massage at the most beautiful salon, followed by lunch at an amazing restaurant. David's family were busy all day with preparations for the 2 days to follow.

Sou's parents' names are Phan Thi Thanh Dung and Lan Tran during the first 2 days we asked did they want us to give them English names, after a few suggestions to consider they were happy with Joan and Jack which we now know them as.

Thursday night, it was our time to be adventurous we set out by ourselves to do a Jeep Tour of the city ending up at a rooftop bar for cocktails. It was an early start on Friday, 6:30am, David's family, relatives and friends took a 3-hour Bus Journey south of the city to Jane's family home in BenTre Province for a traditional marriage ceremony for the joining together of the 2 families. The Bride's family gives their blessing for their daughter to leave and now become part of the grooms family. The ceremony included a traditional commitment ceremony between the families and between David and Jane, there was also the presentation of gifts from each family, a meal for around 100 relatives and friends of Jane's family followed the ceremony. It was a very warm day and very humid of course, Jane spoilt us by insisting we take a break in an air- conditioned room, we tried to say we were ok but they insisted maybe our perspiration suggested otherwise.

Alvin also took advantage and joined us. As is tradition the couple then return to the groom's family home, so we boarded the bus and

began the 3 hour return trip to the city.

At David's family home, another ceremony took place firstly there were prayers said including the Rosary to ask for the blessing of their ancestors. This was very moving as it was done in front of the beautiful decorated alter where deceased family members photos are displayed. This was followed by extended family presenting David and Jane with gifts. For the celebrations on this day Jane and David both wore traditional Vietnamese clothes the "Ao Dai". We were then back on the bus and went to a restaurant for dinner with both families and close friends of the couple, the day ended at around 10pm.

Saturday November 16<sup>th</sup> was the wedding day which took place at Daivid's families Parish Church. It is a beautiful Church just 400metres from their home. David's Mum attends Mass here every day. This was a traditional Nuptial Mass in Vietnamese of course. Bernie and I could still feel the wonderful connection the Priest had to the community and we certainly felt his passion as he spoke of the meaning of Love.

Saturday night it was time for the Wedding Party where about 150 people attended. The party was very different to an Australian Wedding Reception it was more casual with a definite Party atmosphere even including party games which took us by surprise. Again, another honour was when I was asked to make a speech at the party, Jane translated what I was saying. We were surprised that the party ended very early it was soon after the meals were finished which was around 9pm

During the 2 days of the wedding as is tradition Jane had many different beautiful dresses including a magnificent wedding gown similar to what we see as traditional in Australia.

On Sunday we visited Sou's Family home and then with her Mum and Dad, we toured the Independence Palace in the city. The Palace was very elaborate and had high quality furnishings throughout. That evening we had Dinner at a restaurant with a German Cuisine, it really surprised us, it was more like Hahndorf than Vietnam.

It had been a hectic time since we arrived, on Monday we had time to relax and spend time with David's whole family and enjoy lunch with them at his Mum's home.

#### **OUR SANDSTONE FUTURE**

The second Vatican council began in October 1962. The Holy Father Pope John XXIII called the cardinals of the world to Rome to discuss the modernisation of the Church after 20 centuries of life. This milestone in church history set off a deep transformation within the Church itself, in its relations with the 20th century modern world and with other Christian churches, and the way liturgical services were done.

Languages other than Latin were to be used and the participation of the laity was encouraged, to a greater degree than ever before. The legacy of Vatican II is a divided one. The truths of the Church were not altered. This century has seen a worldwide improvement in reading ability throughout the world. Vatican II issued 16 documents of explanation of our faith and altered ways of liturgy.

For some Catholics the promise of far reaching reforms seems unfulfilled.- for others the reforms went too far...it was easier when the priests made all the decisions and that the traditional beauty of the Latin Mass was lost and the liturgical reforms changed the way we pray, - change is always unsettling.

Father John Honner made extensive renovations to the sanctuary in Holy Redeemer church, because the Vatican council decreed that the priest celebrate Mass facing the people, in the language that was commonly used in that country. The first Mass was said here in 1971 on a new altar, with no altar rails and the congregation standing to receive Holy Communion. It

was a very hard time for the elderly priests who had given a lifetime of service, in Latin but we are always "in safe hands" when we follow the Holy Father's instructions.

Fr Honner told me. he made the structural changes to the Church building, but it was with Fr David Abfalter in 1976 that a new level of participation became a reality. This happy, holy priest who followed Fr John had a way of instilling enthusiasm to all he came in contact with and he instituted a wider involvement of lay people in the

management of Parish affairs as requested by Vatican II.

Father David was friends with everyone - what ever their age. Soon the local Sunday Masses became three instead of two each weekend with the introduction of the Saturday evening Mass. The length of time required for fasting was shortened and the reception of Holy Communion at each Mass was encouraged.

The management of the Parish affairs was run by a Parish Pastoral Council with the priest having the power to veto any decision. Our first Parish Council chairman was the late John Uren. The council consisted of delegates from the many active groups in the Parish and sub committees from 1. finance, 2. the school, 3. parents and friends, 4. Catholic women's league, 5.

St Vincent de Paul group, 6. Liturgy and Faith, 7. Christian life and community care group.

The school was still expanding but the number of children in State schools and the High school worried Fr David. He applied to the Josephite order and was granted a pastoral associate to work amongst the Parish half time, the other 50% was spent in the Birdwood parish. Sr Anna was a great help to Fr David. During his time here he invited the

Little Sister of Jesus followers of the St Charles de Focauld order, to live in Murray Bridge. This group of self sufficient social workers helped so many people in the town, concentrating on those in trouble, or underprivileged. Two religious orders doing three different works of charity!!! Indeed a vibrant parish!!!

In 1977, the parish saw the induction of the first Lay ministers in our church. They were Wendy Uren, Maureen Mobbs, Lorna Dickinson and 5 men who are now all deceased. J Huppatz, G O'Neil, J Starmans. J Monaghan and J Farmilo and all our current ministers have followed in their footsteps.




In Father David's time, the Parish joined in a huge celebration of Italian culture with people from all over the state. Thousands joined our strong Italian families in the SAGRA festival. The 70th anniversary of the laying of the foundation stone was a large celebration with many former priests celebrating in the now modernised church.

Father David was highly respected by the other Christian churches and they formed a combined churches group among the ministers. In 1979, Father David suffered major heart failure and it became obvious he could not continue. He, like many other priests before him, and certainly since him, burnt himself out in the service of God and his people. He made every person feel special and his popularity in the town was evident at his farewell. He transferred to the Parish of Tranmere, where sadly a short time later he died at a young age but will always be remembered by those who knew him.



It seems only yesterday that Mary and I came to serve in Murray Bridge – that was in May 2022 when I was sent, in my capacity as a deacon, by the Archbishop to assist Fr Philip, who was then the administrator of the Murray Lands cluster of parishes: Murray Bridge, Murray Mallee & Mallee Border. Before we came over, my thinking was that Murray Bridge is only an hour and a half travel from our home in Adelaide, no worries, we can do the commuting alright. I found out later that assignment to Murray Bridge includes Mannum, Tailem Bend, Meningie, Lameroo and Pinnaroo!

Fr George hails from Kenya and prior to this appointment, he has been serving since 2023 as an assistant priest at the Cathedral. He is a very capable priest and his command of the English language is very good. I hope that you will welcome him in your midst with open arms and caring hearts. I am sure that you will grow to love him, given the chance.

When Fr George arrives at the end of April, my role will revert to that of an assisting cleric, i.e. a deacon in the parish. Mary and I will continue to be with you, for a while longer, to assist Fr George to settle in. We hope we can all work together, as we have been doing in the past couple of years, to revitalize our parishes. Let us all pray together for this. #### Parishioner Story



Beverly (Bev) Villaver; was born on Oct. 22, in the Philippines;

I was baptised as an infant; thus, I can't remember, My childhood was not very interesting. My parents were more focused with work to provide for the family. I am the eldest of 6 siblings: 4 girls and 2 boys.

Grandma's influence, on Papa's side, is very special. She took me to church on Sundays, not far from their Spanish house in San Fernando. Grandpa had a tradition for non-stop cantata every Easter and workers from the mountains came and stayed with us for the week. Grandpa said "Prayers are private. You pray behind closed doors." Every 4:00 AM, I would hear music from a nearby church, which woke me up. I was probably 5 years old when I was drawn to Mario Lanza's amazing voice.

In my teens, my favorite quote was The Golden Rule (Matt. 7:12). I didn't know this was biblical. Bible reading then was reserved for priests. I went to church three times a week in High School, thinking doing so will save me. I was naïve.

During uni holidays in the Philippines, I taught catechism to the neighborhood children, offering them food/snacks. I had 25+ children in an old wooden make-shift chapel, making sure each child learnt the basics, especially The Lord's Prayer.

I started singing solo in my cousins' Police Band, to a trio, then with a band in Manila. My manager formed a Future Generation band where we worked in Singapore and Malaysia for over 2 years. Fast forward, I was married to a farmer in Culburra, a farming community between Coonalpyn and Tintinara. My 2 children were baptised in a Catholic church in Tinty. When my marriage broke down, we moved so much: 6 times in 7 years. We lived in Kingston, S.E. in our beach shack there. I "cried buckets" during weekly visits from a Uniting Church (UC) lady referred by my ex-husband's cousin. My children became my strength but God always provided. I travelled back and forth and the children stayed with their grandparents in Tinty while I studied. It wasn't ideal to have my children live in 3 different houses in a week, so I applied for a Housing Trust in Murray Bridge, to be closer to TAFE.

One of my TAFE lecturers suggested I study at uni. The rest is now history. My Medical Technology (Philippines) background helped with my SATAC application. I was accepted at Flinders University to study Bachelor of Behavioral Science (Psychology), picked up part-time work at Disability SA, then Women's Health at Country Health. The UC supported me a lot and am forever grateful my children put up with me during stressful times being a student.

In mid-90's, I was asked by Holy Trinity Brompton to join a 2-week International Alpha Convention in London with Nicky Gumbel, which they all pay for. I taught Alpha in Philippines before "Alpha for Catholics" was introduced. It was tough introducing "something un-Catholic" to a strongly Catholic country. Again, food helped me to get through to people's hearts. I delivered Alpha at a local primary school. While still in the Philippines, I noted people put Bibles on lay-by and thought this was crazy. I rang UC here and parishioners donated money for "Bibles in the Philippines". The Bibles arrived as I left Cebu so Papa delivered the Catholic Bibles in our language at the local church and the priest blessed the 7 boxes of Bibles, each box has 20 Bibles! There were no photos or Facebook at the time but I'm sure Papa was very proud.

I was with the Trauma Counselling Team in late-90's, in the mountains of Bougainville, the first SA trauma counseling team after PNG's 20 years of war. The team contracted malaria while there, even with medications. I was sick with malaria coming back.

I was a member of the Heysen Trail Walking Group for many years. Sadly, its members are now either too old or passed away. I enjoyed this group very much. I write poetry, but one has to be spiritually quiet to "listen" and be guided, pen in hand, to write something down. I am better writing than speaking. I still love music but practice is now scarce. My son, also a "muso," works as FIFO in WA. My daughter is an artist in Melbourne. I instilled in my children "to follow their heart in whatever they do".

I earned my Masters in Social Work through Flinders University, still working full-time and studying part-time. I am not fond of online studies but finally finished it over 3 years. I joined Salisbury choir, Frustus Agustini (FA) precovid, attended morning mass in Murray Bridge then FA choir practice in Salisbury for Sunday nights mass. The maestro happened to be my pianist's son in Cebu. Such a small world indeed!

Since being active in MB Catholic Parish I have studied online at Dayton University – Ohio, supported by Adelaide Archdiocese. I'm doing this to activate my brain at my age. I became the Child Protection Contact Person and lead the Children's Liturgy with 2 other volunteers. This year, I decided to retire and volunteer (again) at MB Resthaven 2 days a week. I miss the routine of work but also love catching up with myself. I enjoy singing at church here and hope to rejoin FA choir in Salisbury, who are only happy to welcome me back. Only time will tell. I leave everything in God's Hands. His timing is always perfect.

Classes celebrated St Joseph's Day with a school Mass led by Fr Philip and Deacon Arturo and Year 6 students, followed by sports day activities organised by team captains. We were blessed with beautiful weather and students looked very colourful in their Sports Day coloured shirts and had a wonderful time.

Mrs Lynne Liebich with our Year 5 students has been preparing our Easter Plays to share with the school and Parish communities during the last week of term. This year Lynne is using shadow puppets to tell the story of the journey Jesus made from Palm Sunday to his crucifixion on the cross.


